Leonardo's Horses: Studies of Horses and Other Animals by Leonardo da Vinci from the Royal Library at Windsor Castle

Fifty studies of horses and other animals relating to several of Leonardo's major projects are being lent for the first time by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II from the Royal Library at Windsor Castle for an American tour, which will premiere at the National Gallery. Dating from 1478 to about 1517, these drawings are among the most renowned animal studies in the world.

Most of the drawings in this exhibition focus on Leonardo's treatment and studies of horses; several include sketches of cats, donkeys, oxen, dragons, and other fanciful creatures. The Royal Collection of drawings and watercolors, numbering about thirty thousand separate items, is kept in the Print Room attached to the Royal Library at Windsor Castle. The fully illustrated catalogue for this exhibition has been written by Jane Roberts, Curator of the Print Room at the Royal Library, Windsor Castle, and by Dr. Carlo Pedretti of the University of California.

The Gallery is located between 3rd and 7th Streets, N.W., on Constitution Avenue. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway.
