The Washington Men's Camerata was founded in 1984 to perform, promote, and preserve the rich legacy of men's choral music. In addition to its well-received concerts at the National Gallery, the ensemble has sung at the Smithsonian Institution, the Embassy of the Russian Federation, the National Building Museum, Harvard and Princeton Universities, and the White House. Since 1994 the Camerata's regular subscription series has included annual performances at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. Internationally known soloists who have appeared with the Camerata include soprano Phyllis Bryn-Julson and baritone John Shirley-Quirk, and the choir has performed with the National Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Christopher Hogwood and the National Gallery Orchestra under George Manos. The Camerata has been featured on National Public Radio's All Things Considered, Performance Today, and Pipe Dreams, and on WETA-FM's Music from Washington. In 1998, with the cooperation of Yale and Georgetown Universities, the Camerata established a national repository library of men's choral music in Washington. Through the Repository Library, the Camerata intends to play a leading role in preserving the tradition of men's choruses, and plans to work with the Smithsonian Institution and the Library of Congress to ensure that the library will serve as a resource for music scholars as well. The Washington Camerata has recorded three critically acclaimed CDs: Masters in This Hall: Christmas Music for Men's Chorus (1993), Over the Sea to Skye (1997), and most recently The Spirit of Freedom: Patriotic Sones & Service Hymns (1999), all on the Gothic label.

Frank Albinder joined the Washington Men's Camerata as music director in September 1999. He came to the Camerata from the internationally renowned male vocal ensemble Chanticleer, where he most recently served as associate conductor. Over the course of his eleven-year tenure with Chanticleer, Albinder served as tour manager, librarian, recording sales manager, and stage manager. He holds a bachelor of arts degree in vocal performance from Pomona College in California and master of music degrees in choral conducting and vocal performance from the New

England Conservatory of Music.

Pianist and conductor Michael Patterson received the doctor of musical arts degree in piano performance from The Catholic University of America. His principal mentor was Béla Nagy. He has performed as soloist, accompanist, and chamber musician throughout the United States and appears frequently in Washington at the Kennedy Center, the Phillips Collection, the Corcoran Gallery, the Organization of American States, the German and French Embassies, and the National Gallery. As conductor of the United States Congressional Chorus, Patterson has led performances for the inauguration of presidents Bush and Clinton, the bicentennial celebration of the United States Congress, the nationally televised Christmas in Washington program, and In Concert at the White House.
