NATIONAL GALLERY PROGRAMS EXPLORE VAN GOGH'S DIVERSE CAREER

Washington, D.C. -- Special programs exploring diverse aspects of Vincent van Gogh's career will be held at the National Gallery of Art this fall in conjunction with <u>Van Gogh's Van Goghs: Masterpieces from the Van Gogh Museum, Amsterdam</u>, a rich survey of the artist's paintings on view in the West Building from October 4, 1998 through January 3, 1999. Highlights include in-depth individual lectures by art scholars such as John Leighton, director of the Van Gogh Museum, and Cynthia Saltzman, author of the new book <u>Portrait of Dr. Gachet</u>; a six-part lecture series addressing several aspects of Van Gogh's life and career; a concert of music by composers who were Van Gogh's contemporaries; and a series of biographical and documentary films on the artist.

Admission to all programs is free of charge, unless otherwise noted, and attendees will be admitted on a first-come, first-served basis. Passes are required daily for admission to Van Gogh's Van Goghs. For information, call (202) 737-4215. Details follow.
