On April 11th a group of 41 Nineteenth Century French paintings from the Chester Dale Collection will be placed on exhibition at the National Gallery of Art. These paintings, which have been sent to Washington on indefinite loan, will fill three large galleries, in addition to the two galleries in which 25 paintings of this school, from the Chester Dale Collection, are now on view.

Also on view at the present time, on loan from this Collection, are important examples of the work of El Greco, Zurbarán, Rubens, Tintoretto, Boucher, Drouais, Chardin, Boilly, Kalf and Van Hemessen, as well as well-known American paintings by Morse, Sully, Sargent, Bellows and others.

The larger group of French paintings, which has now come to the Gallery, includes some of the finest examples of the work of Boudin, Cezanne, Corot, Courbet, Daumier, Delacroix, Fantin-Latour, Gauguin, Guillaumin, Manet, Monet, Berthe Morisot, Pissarro, Odilon Redon, Renoir, Henri Rousseau, Sisley, Toulouse-Lautrec, and Van Gogh. Included also with the French group are six outstanding paintings by Mary Cassatt, the distinguished American artist, so long resident in France and closely identified there with the Impressionist School.

This group of paintings, with the examples of the work of Cezanne, Puvis de Chavannes, Corot, Courbet, Daubigny, David,

Degas, Delacroix, Fantin-Latour, Manet, Monticelli, Berthe
Morisot, Pissarro, and Renoir, heretofore loaned from the
Chester Dale Collection and now on view at the National Gallery,
will illustrate, in a most comprehensive manner, the development of French painting during its greatest period. All the
movements of French Nineteenth Century art, which succeeded
each other with such amazing rapidity, are shown by superlative examples, chosen with great taste and discrimination, not
only for their beauty, but for their significance as expressing one of the great epochs of painting.

The Chester Dale Collection has long been recognized as one of the most important collections of Nineteenth Century

French painting ever assembled by a private individual. Many of the paintings have been seen in loan exhibitions in this country and in Europe. They have also been available to students, through the courtesy of Mr. Dale, in his home in New York. Now, with great generosity and self-denial, he has taken them from his home and sent them on indefinite loan to Washington, where they can be enjoyed by all who visit the National Gallery.
