WASHINGTON, October 30: Samuel H. Kress, of New York, has given to the Nation a large new collection of rare Italian art, including some of the greatest masterpieces of painting and sculpture in America, it was announced here today by David E. Finley, Director of the National Gallery of Art.

The new Kress gift enriches the National Gallery with many world-famous works, among them the celebrated Raphael painting of <u>Bindo Altoviti</u>; the Domenico Veneziano <u>Saint John in the</u> <u>Desert</u>, one of the most beautiful of all fifteenth-century panels; the famous bust of <u>Lorenzo the Magnificent</u> by Verrocchio; and a marble bust of the <u>Christ Child</u> by Desiderio da Settignano and a bust, also in marble, of the youthful <u>St. John</u> by Antonio Rossellino, two of the most important pieces of sculpture to leave Italy in recent years.

The new donation by Mr. Kress and the Samuel H. Kress Foundation consists of more than ninety paintings and pieces of sculpture, and will make the National Gallery's collection of Italian art one of the most comprehensive in the world, rivaled only by the four leading European collections in Florence, London, Paris and Berlin, it was pointed out here today.

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As a war-time safety measure, some of these great works of art, previously on loan to the Gallery, were evacuated from Washington at the start of the war. They have recently been returned and will shortly be placed on exhibition. These are now given to the Gallery and in addition Mr. Kress has presented a large new group of paintings and sculpture, which will likewise be put on exhibition at the National Gallery as soon as conditions permit, according to Mr. Finley, the Gallery's director.

The present gift is the third large Kress donation to the National Gallery and emphasizes the steady growth of the Nation's collection, Mr. Finley declared. The new gift will augment the great Kress Collection of Italian paintings presented to the Gallery at the time of its opening. In July, 1944, the same donors also gave one of the most notable series of French eighteenthcentury paintings ever received by any museum.

Describing some of the outstanding new acquisitions, John Walker, Chief Curator of the National Gallery, emphasized the importance and rarity of these works, such as Raphael's <u>Bindo Altoviti</u>, formerly one of the treasures of the Alte Pinakothek in Munich, and paintings by Domenico Veneziano and other rare masters.

"It is very gratifying to know," said Mr. Walker, "that with this gift the National Gallery of Art now has four of the thirteen panels generally ascribed to Domenico Veneziano. The new panel, <u>Saint John in the Desert</u>, once formed part of the Saint Lucy altarpiece, now one of the glories of the Uffizi Gallery in Florence. Another from the same altarpiece was given by Mr. Kress at the time of the opening of the National Gallery."

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"With the new <u>Madonna and Child</u> formerly in the Brady Collection the Gallery acquires a sixth painting by Botticelli, the largest number of panels by that artist in any museum, except the Uffizi and the National Gallery. London."

Mr. Walker also pointed out that the Kress gift to the National Gallery of Art, also includes Bonfigli's <u>Madonna and Child Enthroned</u>, the most important painting by this rare master with the exception of those in his native town of Perugia. Among other works in this donation are Baronzio's <u>Madonna and Child with Angels</u> formerly in the Otto Kahn Collection, as well as a superb <u>Madonna</u> by Giovanni Bellini, a <u>Coronation of the Virgin</u> by Filippino Lippi and an Annunciation by Fra Filippo Lippi.

Melozzo da Forli, whose paintings of music-making angels in the Vatican are well known to all tourists, is represented in the new gift by two panels of the same subject, the only work of this painter in America.

Of a later period there is Dosso Dossi's <u>Circe and Her Lovers</u> <u>in a Landscape</u>, which aroused great interest when shown at the Italian Exhibition in London in 1930, being one of this artist's outstanding achievements. There is also a view of the <u>Exterior of the</u> <u>Pantheon</u> by Panini, which will form a pendant to the <u>Interior of the</u> Pantheon by the same artist, already given by Mr. Kress. Contemporary artists will benefit especially from the cycle of nine frescoes by Luini, illustrating the legend of Cephalus, from the Villa Pelucca. Apart from their intrinsic beauty these offer the most extensive evidence available in this country of the technique of sixteenth-century fresco painting. To show the Luini frescoes as nearly as possible in a setting like the original, and to stress their beauty as architectural decoration, the Gallery will install them in a special room, as soon as construction materials are again available.

In addition to the paintings, the Kress donation includes famous pieces of sculpture by many of the greatest masters; and as a result of this gift the representation of Florentine Renaissance sculpture in the National Gallery of Art is now among the four or five greatest collections in the world.

"Ghiberti's lovely relief of the <u>Madonna</u>, in painted terra cotta, once in Santo Spirito, Florence, is the earliest piece of Florentine sculpture in the new donation," Mr. Walker pointed out. "Benedetto's marble tondo, <u>Madonna and Child</u>, full of quiet and contemplative emotion, rivals in artistic quality and composition his famous Strozzi tomb, erected in 1491 in Santa Maria Novella, Florence, and probably adorned a similar monument."

Particularly noteworthy, he added, is the gift of Verrocchio's celebrated monumental bust of <u>Lorenzo the Magnificent</u>, especially as the National Gallery is already the possessor of Verrocchio's bust of <u>Giuliano de' Medici</u>, younger brother of Lorenzo. A miracle of psychological interpretation of this master of political persuasion, it is doubtless the model of all the other existing effigies of Lorenzo.

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One of the greatest events in recent years in the history of Italian sculpture collections is the re-uniting in America of the two Vanchetoni marble busts through the Kress gift to the National Gallery of Desiderio's little <u>Christ Child</u>. Unsurpassed in delicacy of handling and irresistible in its rendering of the charm of childhood, it is perhaps the most remarkable of all Florentine child portraits, Mr. Walker stated. The little bust comes from the Vanchetoni chapel in Florence, where originally it formed a pair with Rossellino's <u>Giovannino</u> bust, also now given to the National Gallery as part of the present Kress donation. These two exquisite works will now be reunited and exhibited together.

Among other notable pieces are the <u>Saint John</u> by Donatello, and the marble bust of <u>Saint Catherine of Siena</u>, ascribed to Mino da Fiesole, which ranks as one of the most delicate examples of portraiture in all sculpture. Other sculptors who established the leadership of Florence in the fifteenth century are also represented in the gift, such as Antonio Pollaiuolo with a <u>Bust of a</u> <u>Warrior</u>, and Benedetto da Maiano, with the <u>Portrait of a Florentine</u> <u>Statesman</u>, both celebrated pieces formerly in the Mackay Collection.

From the Dreyfus Collection come two statuettes, one of <u>Saint Sebastian</u>, by the outstanding artist of Lucca, Matteo Civitale, and the other of <u>David</u>, by the master of Leonardo da Vinci, Andrea Verrocchio. The collection of North Italian sculpture is also enriched by the addition of important works by Pietro Lombardo, Amadeo, Solari, Leone Leoni and Vittoria.

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The Kress gift of sculpture is not limited to the works of the Renaissance. Bernini's sumptuous bronze <u>Portrait of Louis</u> <u>XIV</u> expresses the magnificence of the baroque style, and the influence of Italy and France in the seventeenth century is shown by a large marble statue representing <u>Victory</u>, by Germain Filon, and the bust of the <u>Duc de Chaulnes</u> by Coysevox. The latest pieces of sculpture in the Kress gift are two marble statues by Carpeaux, one of a <u>Neapolitan Fisher Boy</u> and the other a <u>Girl with a Shell</u>.
