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RENOWNED OLD MASTERS COLLECTION
ANNOUNCED TO TOUR U. S.

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 29, 1979. One of the most important loan exhibitions of old master paintings ever presented in the United States will begin a nine-city tour at the National Gallery of Art this fall. The exhibition comes from the renowned collection of Baron Hans Heinrich Thyssen-Bornemisza of Lugano, Switzerland.

This is the first time the Thyssen-Bornemisza collection has been shown in this country. The splendid collection is one of the few of its kind still in private hands.

Entitled Old Master Paintings from the Collection of Baron Thyssen-Bornemisza, the exhibition will be comprised of a selection of fifty-seven paintings dating from the fourteenth to the nineteenth centuries.

Ranging from Duccio to Goya, it will include paintings by such masters as Van Eyck, Petrus Christus, Carpaccio, Cranach, Titian, El Greco, Zurbarán, Rubens, Rembrandt, and Fragonard.

The exhibition has been organized by the International Exhibitions

Foundation, Washington, D. C., and will travel to eight cities after it leaves

the National Gallery's new East Building: Detroit, Minneapolis, Cleveland,

Los Angeles, Denver, Fort Worth, Kansas City, and New York. It has been

made possible in part by a grant from United Technologies Corporation, and

has been supported in part by a federal indemnity from the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities, and with a special grant in support of the catalogue from The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.

His Excellency the Ambassador of Switzerland, Raymond Probst, is the honorary patron of the exhibition.

The selection of the show was made by John Walker, Director Emeritus of the National Gallery of Art. Among the Italian paintings in the exhibition will be a rare panel, dated 1311, Christ and the Samaritan Woman at the Fountain by one of the earliest and most important Italian masters, the Sienese artist Duccio di Buoninsegna. Among the seventeen other Italian pictures will be Young Knight in a Landscape by Carpaccio, one of the great paintings in the collection and considered the greatest masterpiece in the fifteenth-century Venetian painter's oeuvre; and Saint Catherine Before Pope Gregory IX by the fifteenth-century Sienese master Giovanni di Paolo. The great age of Venetian eighteenth-century painting will be represented with two works each by Canaletto and Guardi.

Among the nine works by Flemish masters will be two outstanding grisaille panels of the <u>Annunciation</u> by Jan van Eyck, the rare fifteenth-century master who is renowned for his exquisite handling of light, space and texture; <u>Portrait of a Young Man</u> by Hans Memling, with a landscape background and a fine still life with vase of flowers painted on the reverse; and <u>Our Lady of the Barren Tree</u> by Petrus Christus, another important fifteenth-century Flemish master by whom very few pictures have survived. Also included will be <u>The Toilette of Venus</u> by the greatest Flemish artist of the seventeenth century, Peter Paul Rubens; this picture was probably painted by Rubens after Titian's work of the same title in the National Gallery's collection.

The Thyssen-Bornemisza collection is also rich in early German works, and eight sixteenth-century paintings will be on view. Included will be portraits by Albrecht Altdorfer and Hans Baldung Grien as well as the Madonna with the Bunch of Grapes by Lucas Cranach the Elder, a major and influential master; and the powerful Annunciation to Saint Anne and Saint Joachim by Bernhard Strigel, which the Baron acquired at the recent von Hirsch sale.

Among the eleven Dutch pictures of the seventeenth century will be

Portrait of a Gentleman by Rembrandt; Interior of the Council Chamber of

Burgomasters in the Town Hall in Amsterdam, with Visitors by Pieter de

Hooch, who is best-known for his peaceful interiors of the well-to-do

burghers of the time; Self Portrait by Jan Steen, the renowned genre

painter; a Still Life by Willem Claesz Heda, the master who developed

North Netherlandish still life painting; and Still Life with Nautilus Cup

by Willem Kalf, one of the most important Dutch still life painters.

Six seventeenth- and eighteenth-century French paintings will be on view including La Toilette by François Boucher, one of the superb examples of the artist's genre scenes painted in his best period, and The Seesaw by Jean-Honoré Fragonard, one of the greatest masters of eighteenth-century France.

Unusually fine Spanish paintings will include two versions of the Annunciation by the sixteenth-century master El Greco, whose unique pictoral style represents one of the highest achievements of European art; El Tio Paquete and Ansensio Julia in His Studio by Goya, the great eighteenth-century Spanish artist; and Saint Agnes by Zurbarán, the major seventeenth-century artist, whose religious paintings are fused with realism.

A fully illustrated catalogue accompanying the exhibition will include an introduction by John Walker, and individual entries on the paintings by Allen Rosenbaum, Curator of Paintings at Princeton University.
