ADVANCE PASSES AVAILABLE STARTING AUGUST 30, 1998 FOR "VAN GOGH'S VAN GOGHS" AND "EDO: ART IN JAPAN 1615-1868" AT NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART, WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Starting Sunday, August 30, 1998, advance passes for <u>Van Gogh's Van Goghs: Masterpieces from the Van Gogh Museum, Amsterdam</u> and <u>Edo:</u>

<u>Art in Japan 1615–1868</u> will be available at the East Building of the National Gallery of Art and through TicketMaster.

"We encourage everyone who plans to see these important exhibitions to get passes ahead of time to make their experience at the National Gallery more enjoyable," said Earl A. Powell III, director, National Gallery of Art.

Daily passes will be required for <u>Van Gogh's Van Goghs</u> (October 4, 1998 – January 3, 1999). An unprecedented loan of 70 paintings by Vincent van Gogh (1853–1890) from the Van Gogh Museum, Amsterdam, will comprise the largest survey of the artist's career to be seen outside The Netherlands in more than a quarter of a century.

For Edo: Art in Japan 1615–1868 (November 15, 1998 - February 15, 1999), passes will be required on weekends, federal holidays, and busy days during the holiday season (Saturdays and Sundays, as well as November 26 and 27; December 28, 29, 30, and 31,

1998; and January 18 and February 15, 1999). Nearly 300 painted scrolls, screens, costumes, armor, sculpture, ceramics, lacquer, and woodblock prints will reveal the vibrant popular culture of Edo, the largest city in the world in the eighteenth century.

ADVANCE PASSES

Advance passes for both exhibitions can be obtained free of charge beginning

August 30, 1998, at the East Building pass desk at Fourth Street and Constitution Avenue,

N.W., during public hours, Monday–Saturday, 10–5, and Sunday, 11–6. There is a limit of
six passes per person. Advance passes may also be obtained beginning August 30, 1998,
at all TicketMaster locations and Hecht's stores for a service charge of \$2.00 per pass
and through TicketMaster PhoneCharge for a \$2.75 service fee per pass and a \$1.25

SAME-DAY PASSES

A limited number of same-day passes will be available free of charge every day that each exhibition is open. They may be obtained on a first-come, first-served basis during public hours. There is a limit of six passes per person.

Beginning October 4, 1998, same-day passes for <u>Van Gogh's Van Goghs</u> may be picked up during public hours at the West Building pass desk, in the Rotunda on the main floor. Beginning November 15, 1998, same-day passes for <u>Edo: Art in Japan</u>

1615–1868 may be picked up at the East Building pass desk.
